They've got a great new single - Brewin' Up A Storm - coming out in the New Year, an appearance on The Late, Late Christmas Show on December 22nd, a video planned for early January directed by no less than Druid's Garry Hynes, and they'll also be headlining the great Macnas New Year's Eve Ball. And they're finishing off what has been a very suc-cessful year. Their third single Romeo's On Fire got a lot of air-play, and their stint in Dublin at the SFX as part of the "7 Bands on the Up" (which will be screened January on RTE) Megagig was, by general consent, the show-stealer!
They've also built up a big
following around the country, having already
become Galway's favourite band.

SUCCESS

The lads have been playing together for about four years, but they made their debut as The Stunning in February '37 when they played an amazing gig at The Hilltop in Salthill. Got To Get Away was their first single and it was immediately clear that here mediately clear that here was a band with an exciting, original sound. The success of the timeless and seductive Half Past Two consolidated their early success. And now the band is eager to branch out and start testing their luck on foreign shores. They've already played in London, but so far mainly to Irish crowds who are already among the converted. "What we want to do now", Steve Wall told me, "is break through to the English market."

With their fourth single ready for release, Steve feels they now have to start thinking about an album. "We have a lot of

good material on demo tape and we're hopeful that with media exposure on The Late, Late and the 7 Bands On The Up RTE programme, we'll attract attention from a major label.

GREAT **MUSICIANS**

Certainly they deserve it. A 5-track demo was left in earlier this week and I've been playing it ever since. Made a the West One Studio in Ballybane, it is highly accomplished and really highlights the considerable strengths of the band. Derek Murray, the lead guitarist, is a very "tasty" player, who brings a kind of fluid jazz sound the strength of the str to the group's music. But the songs - you've pro-bably heard some of them already - are all good, and vocalist Steve Wall has already developed a very distinctive style.

GARRY HYNES DOING VIDEO

Getting Garry Hynes to direct their first video is quite a coup. Steve used to work with Druid and when they were considering making a video, he ap-proached her. "She was taken by the idea. She's never worked with film before, and certainly not Rock video! I think she sees it as a challenge and a chance to branch out in-to a new area." Shooting will begin during the second week of January. "We all sit around and bounce ideas off each other. She doesn't want to impose an idea on it. I think it'll be a real col-laboration."

Right now, however, The Stunning are really excited about the Macnas New Year's Eve Ball, "I think it'll be a great night", Steve said. "We'll do our own set and then Ollie has planned what he calls "The Hits of 80's". calls "The Hits of 80's". Garry Glitter is coming too, not to mention Paul Brady and Mary Coughlan". Who knows, maybe Paul McCartney might take time out to drop in? Be there, folks! You might never see anything like it again!

One name which stands out this year is the French Canadian producer Daniel Lanois, who added to his previous credits (Robbie Robertson's solo album and U2's The Joshua Tree in '87), three of this year's finest - Dylan's Oh Mercy, The Neville Brothers' Yellow Moon, and his own haunting Acadie. NEW YORK - Lou Reed. Sharp, witty lyrics - pared-down instumentation - this is an extended, integrated report on the collapse of civilization (i.e. York) as we know it.



OH MERCY - Bob Dylan. After nearly a decade "footling" around and going through the motions, Dylan reminds us why he's been called a genius. (Having Lanois as producer certainly helped
