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Tip leads to arrests in car theft case

Students who park their cars in the Fourth Street parking lot of the college may feel a little bit relieved.

For the first time after 20 car thefts in that particular parking lot since October, someone has come forward with information giving the names of those involved. Now five teenagers and one adult have been charged with the break-ins.

Most of the thefts were committed by a 17-year-old male who has been placed in a juvenile delinquency program on an arrest for a different crime.

He and two others the same age, along with Joshua David Cagle, 22, and Darren M. Felmlee, 18, both of 332 Academy St., and Shawn Hoffman, 19, of 304 Fourth St., face theft charges.

Most of the stolen goods recovered by the police included audio equipment, such as homemade speakers, walkmans, and CDs. According to Williamsport Police Agent William J. Weber, these six arrests will clear 11 of the incidents. He feels another person may be responsible for the other six thefts.

Jeff Baird, head of Lycoming College's security department, knew that the thefts had to be by the same people because of many circumstances.

One was the same nature of each car theft.

"Most of the thefts occurred when the weather was cold," Baird said. "So, it looks like they cracked the windows, and then broke them by punching hard with heavy gloves. Then they could just wipe the broken glass out of the way with their coats and unlock the doors."

Each theft seemed to occur around the same time as well, during the night hours, from 9-midnight. Also, the thefts occurred mostly during Sundays, Mondays, and Tuesdays-days Baird feels would be easier to get away with thefts because fewer students use their cars during the first part of the week

"All of the people involved live within blocks of the college," Agent Weber said. "So they could just wait until dark, break a car's windows without noise and wait until no one was coming. Then they could carry the stolen property into shrubs or bushes until it is safe to take it to their homes."

After the first few thefts, Lycoming Security tried to give the lot more attention. Officers spent every free minute beside the lot, and they even tried using surveillance during the hours when the break-ins occurred.

Baird said that at one point, Security confronted two individuals in the parking lot. The two claimed to have no IDs and ran when Security tried to call the police. Eventually, Security found that the two were connected to the thefts. Baird also said that a faculty member also gave a "perfect description" of the same two males at an earlier time of night.

"So, they may have come into the lots to

look for what to take before they came back to break into the cars," he said.

Baird said that Security and the Williamsport Police had a lead to solving the case after the individuals that came forward said that some of the stolen goods were in a used goods shop in Williamsport.

Baird also said that the individuals that came forward with the names of those involved said that there were break-ins at Penn College and in Old Lycoming Township. Baird said that he is not sure of the nature of those cases but knows that all of the recovered items did not belong to just Lycoming College students.

But for the students that have gotten their property back, things are looking better.

One such student is junior Jason Fuller. He had hockey equipment stolen out of his car about two weeks ago, "but I didn't know until last week," he said.

Last Wednesday, Fuller went to the Williamsport police to pick up his helmet, knee and shin guards, and skates. He said he was thankful to have his equipment back

Right now, the college is still using the Park Smart program that security initiated a few years ago to try to crack down on the thefts. Security or Greek organizations survey the cars to look for vehicles that may have valuables that are conspicuous.

Baird said that these cars' owners are given letters explaining that their property could be targeted for theft.

Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers make the waiting worthwhile

Certainly one of the remaining legends in rock music, Tom Petty offers a level of certainty with every new album he produces. Ever since his acclaimed album Full Moon Fever, it is obvious that Petty had certainly upped his game. Despite a somewhat disappointing soundtrack two years ago for the altogether disappointing movie "She's the One," Tom has rebounded and rejoined the heartbreakers for one of his finest efforts of his illustrious career. The soundtrack and his 6 CD box set put off his studio work for over half a decade but the wait was definitely worth it.

With echo, there is the same balance of ballads and rock classics that is present on nearly every one of Petty's albums. This disc begins with the soft track "Room at the Top" which is reminiscent of his last studio undertaking Wildflowers, which is undoubtedly one of the best rock albums of the decade. The remaining fourteen tracks make up over an hour of quality listening that flow together as somewhat of a combination of old school hard rocking Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers with a more introspective, laid back and wiser bunch. The addition of longtime cohorts Howie Epstein on bass and Mike Campbell on guitars gives the album a nostalgic meaning for Tom Petty as well, who decided to venture on without them several years ago.

While many infamous bands such as U2, Mighty Mighty Bosstones, and countless others have adjusted their style to please the pop culture it is always reassuring to hear a Tom Petty album that is exactly what you would want from it. Tracks "Free Girl Now," "I Don't Wanna Fight," and "This One's for Me" have definite potential for classic status. Perhaps the best aspect of this album is that you can put it on and not worry about hearing tracks you



aren't crazy about. The cohesiveness of echo makes it a candidate for his best work yet despite the enormous success and acclaim for Wildflowers. This album earns itself 4 and a half thumbs up out of 5 (whatever that means).
