The Who tour continues after Entwistle's death

The surviving members of The Who turned their mourning into defiant energy in their first concert since last week's sudden death of founding bassist John Entwistle. Guitarist Pete Townshend and singer Roger Daltrey kicked off a North American tour Monday at the Hollywood Bowl in Los Angeles with Pino Palladino filling in for Entwistle.

The first two shows of the trek were canceled after Entwistle, 57, died in his sleep last Thursday in Las Vegas. His bandmates have vowed to go on with the tour as a tribute to him.

In Michigan, The Who is scheduled to appear Aug. 23 at the DTE Energy Music Theater in Auburn Hills, and Aug. 27 at the Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids.

"I just wanted to say that tonight we play for John Entwistle," Daltrey said after opening the show with "I Can't Explain" and "Substitute." The group - rounded out by drummer Zak Starkey, keyboardist John "Rabbit" Bundrick, and Townshend's youngest brother, Simon, on acoustic guitar and backing vocals — then launched into a frenetic rendition of "Who Are You.

Earlier, Townshend said he did not expect Palladino, who has played with Tears For Fears, Eric Clapton, and Eltor John, to "emulate, parody, or copy John Entwistle in any way," the guitarist said in a message posted on his official Web site.

K, the sisterhood part is obvious, but where are the big secrets in "Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood?" The movie is entertaining and the characters engaging enough, but one comes away from the experience wondering what all the fuss was about.

A self-absorbed young mother has a nervous breakdown. Later, her adult daughter struggles with residual resentment and confusion. You expect the revelation of truly deep, dark secrets. Instead, you walk out wondering, "Is that all

there is?" What leaves a lasting impression is the indomitable healing bond of friendship between a quartet of women who call themselves "Ya-Ya priestesses." We meet them as adventurous little girls and later as eccentric dowagers.

The movie adaptation of Rebecca

Wells' 1996 best seller is in the vein of "The Joy Luck Club" and "How to Make an American Quilt." It's a predictable chick flick raised to a level above soap opera by an impressive cast. Ellen Burstyn is right on the mark as Vivi, the cantankerous but charming senior Southern belle who is estranged from Sidda, her accomplished but wounded daughter, played winningly by Sandra Bullock. The straightforward direction by Callie Khouri - best known for writing "Thelma & Louise" - steers clear of mawkish sentimentality.

VIVI IS played in youth by Ashley Judd, who captures the character's high-strung charisma but doesn't provide much emotional heft. We're not convinced she's suffering as she makes periodic

Tom Petty & the Heartbreakers open tour in Grand Rapids


GRAND RAPIDS (Reuters) - Tom Petty & the Heartbreakers don't have a new album or any other new product to promote
